WILL KENTUCKY STAND FOR IT?

I fear not, Morgan, organizer of the Bell Trust, the oligarchy Trust and a dozen other gigantic combinations of capital, conceiving it to be good (?) for the people of this state, requires to merge its independent telephone lines, which he owns or controls with those of the Bell Company which he also largely owns and controls.

A man who goes to bed to be awakened by a universal amount of noise is so to perceive what is inevitable the absorption of the independents by the Bell is allowed to go unchallenged. At one conference held in New York and Chicago a few weeks ago, at which W. P. Fenton, and Mr. Manly, President of the Bell System, and representatives of the independent trusts were present, it was openly stated that with competition ended rates could be raised and economies instituted that would enable the monopoly to place the feet of the independents on a 5 per cent. basis. With both companies operating under practically the same points under one management it follows that one of them will be superfluous, and that it will not lose to pay dividends on the outstanding stock of the absorbed companies than to operate them under the circumstances.

Thus, the monopoly, which now owns the Western Union Telegraph Company and through that corporation has recently acquired six of the largest of the trans-Atlantic cables, will control every channel of communication on land, except the telepost automatic telegraph lines. It would probably buy this too, if the stock of that company was not tied up in a voting trust with Rear Admiral Sigsbee of the "Maneu" and others sitting lightly on the lid to prevent just such a contingency.

With the end of the autonomy of the independents, every advantage secured by competition will be at once surrendered and every section of the state that has heretofore profited by the rivalry for business in it has opposed between the two systems will experience the same arbitrary imposition of rates as has followed the termination of competition elsewhere. The farmer, the grocer and the druggist will pay the freight. They can protest and denounce the trust, call Morgan trash names and make the air heavy with vituperous maledictions, but their own do any good. In effect the trust will say: "If you don't like it, you need not have a telephone." But if you are without telephone connection in these days you cannot do business. The trust knows this. Will the great commonwealth of Kentucky stand idly by the roadside while Wall Street in its greed for added revenues imposes another burden upon this constituency, whereby it may start new tribute from every community in the state?

When he acquired control of the independents, Morgan made no affidavit to the Supreme Court of Ohio that his purchase was for private investment and not for the Bell Company. To get around this he now proposes to turn the stock of the two systems into a joint holding company, which is only another way of "whipping the devil around the stump", and accomplishing by indirection what he is legally proscribed from doing directly. Have the people of Kentucky at whose pocketbook this move is aimed thought to say "I will give my rights and a vote Morgan must respect? Have they become so inert over the frequent abuse of corporate privilege that they hesitate to exercise their franchise? If not its time for them to get busy, before it is too late.

Owensboro, Ky., March 11.—(Special).—The Owensboro Messenger will say in the morning:

"The Hon. Augustus Owenly Stanley, Representative in Congress from the Second district, will announce his candidacy for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination. A statement to this effect will be issued by George W. Mr. Stanley at a house in Henderson. The decision was reached after consulting with his friends from every county in the district for the past three days."

"Mr. Stanley is declining to make the race, after the earnest solicitation of friends in every part of the State, will declare that he has recently been elected to Congress by the Democrats of the Second district. STRIKE ON Q. & C.

The strike of the white firemen on the Q. & C. which has been on for the past week, has resulted in... The strike was called on account of the attitude of the road toward... The railroad officials worked... until the intervention of the... Circuit Judge B. J. Bethum...

Early to-day the sympathizers, with the striking white firemen, resumed activities, and reports were frequent here of shootings and assaults on trainmen between this point and Chattanooga, Tenn. A South bound passenger train, was shot through the city at Glen Mary, Tenn., while remonstrating with a crowd that had blocked a white strikebreaker from his job.

Two Tuesday afternoon Alvie Canfield, a white fireman, was arrested on a suspected passenger train by Special Agent Major of the Queen & Crescent, on a charge of obstructing Detective James Carl at Glen Mary, Tenn. Carl is in a Somerset hospital with a bullet wound in the leg in connection with the strike.

An attempt was made Tuesday for the first time since Saturday to resume freight service out of Somerset. A local freight was made up and heavily guarded by Special agents, started for the south. No freight train passed through here Tuesday. Passenger train service is beginning to suffer and many rail behind schedule time. Shipments of lumber are tied up at Burnside and Somerset and many firms have had orders cancelled on account of their inability to ship.

Steamboats at Burnside are reported unable to depart on account of the lack of fuel coal, and news brought here from Oakdale, Tenn. the terminus of this division, is to the effect that all of the members of train crews running out of that point, had whose homes are elsewhere, have been ordered by the company to report off until they receive notification that they are needed.

The Federation of Trades of Somerset, which includes machinists, boilermaker, pipe fitters and car worker organization, adopted resolutions Tuesday endorsing the walkout of the striking firemen and offering counsel, advice and financial support if necessary. Members of the Federation held a long consultation with H. O. Test, vice president of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers, who has made his headquarters in this city, and there is strong talk of a sympathetic strike by the federation. Tuesday night the following anonymous note was being 'Both sides of the ball will look alike after 7 o'clock to night.'

Speaking to an audience of more than a thousand persons in the opera house Tuesday afternoon, Vice President Test reviewed the circumstances which led to the present strike on the part of the firemen on the Q. & C. route, and asked the moral support of the community, for what he termed 'a white man's cause in a white man's country.' Test said the strike came as a result of a new interpretation by the rail road officials of a contract entered into by the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and the railroad company, providing that firemen will have preference of work, raise or promotion, according to age in service, experience,

skill and ability, being equal, and that vacancies are to be filled by the oldest available firemen in service in line of promotion. It is claimed by the striking firemen that this January 1st last, they were suddenly asked to consider the company's proposal as 'unacceptable merit and ability' by the white firemen and they were not considered available for promotion to preferred rates.

LAND STOCK AND CROP

R. L. Smith was in town Saturday driving his fine station, Silver Date. This is one of the best horses ever brought to the county and will make the season of 1911, which will be his third season in the county, at Mr. Smith's barn near Hitt. Announcements will appear later.

Considerable excitement was occasioned at King's Mountain on Saturday night when eleven shots were fired from the windows of the King's Mountain station at the telegraph operator, F. A. Ross, but none of the bullets struck the intended victim.

The shattered glass was thrown into his face, however, and several serious wounds inflicted. Thomas Brackett, a young white man, was arrested to-day by a special officer from Danville and was placed in the jail at Stanford to await trial charged with the crime.

This is the third time this sort of crime has occurred at the King's Mountain station, the operators being killed in both other cases. Three years ago Harold Vandiver was shot and killed while on duty in the station. Eighteen months ago Matthew Engleman was shot to death at the same place. Detectives innumerable have tried in vain to trace his murderers and no arrests have ever been made.

With American cruisers bound for patrol duty along the eastern and western coasts of Mexico, and with 20,000 regular troops along the border, and American army practically surrounds Mexico, except on the southern frontier. Any filibustering expedition to penetrate the line and aid the insurgents will be next to impossible. Field practice is expected to be ordered in Texas to-morrow.

Sixteen members of the American Legion of Madero's army were killed, six wounded and seventeen captured in the fight between Madero's forces and Mexican troops at Casas Grandes Monday. Among those killed were a brother of Madero and Giuseppe Garibaldi, a nephew of the Italian hero. It is said the Federals lost 100 killed and wounded.

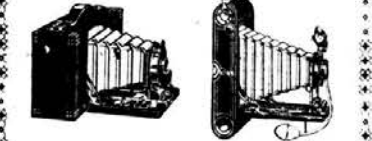

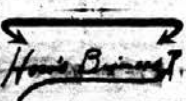

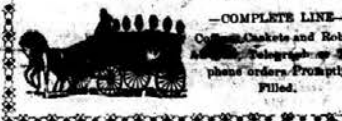
